For Sunday and Saturday Vigil Masses<sup>1</sup>

Optimized for Three Altar Servers<sup>2</sup>

December 6, 2015

Incensation and the specific requirements of special masses, e.g., weddings and funerals are beyond the scope of this document.

#### **SPIRITUAL ATTITUDE by Fr. Dwight Longenecker<sup>3</sup>:**

"...before we get down to particulars, I want you to know why we have altar servers at all. Do priests need you to bring the bread and the water and wine to the altar? No, we could do that ourselves. Do we need you to carry candles and the cross and hold the book? Not really. The priest is supposed to extend his hands in prayer, so he can't hold the book, but we could just put it on the altar. Do we need you to ring the bell and turn the page and wash our hands? No. We could do all that without you.

"You're not really employed to be useful. You're employed to help lead the worship. As long as you understand that, everything else that we teach you will follow. You see, all of us work together to lead the people of God in the worship of God — it's not just the priest. I rely on you not just to do those particular jobs. Instead, I rely on you for something far greater and nobler and more beautiful and more true.

"Our worship on earth reflects the worship in heaven. What we do here at the holy sacrifice of the Mass is a kind of distant echo of what goes on in heaven. There, the Lamb of God is offered in one timeless and eternal sacrifice. There the saints and angels worship around the throne of the Lamb. In that city there is no sun, moon, or stars, for the Lamb Himself is the light of that city. This altar you see here is a reflection of the altar in heaven. This chalice is a sign of the eternal Precious Blood of the Lamb. This host is, on earth, the sign of the Eternal Bread of heaven. The priest is an icon of Christ the Lord — and who are you? You represent and reflect on earth the heavenly host.

"That's right. I want you to represent the saints and angels. That's why we have children serve the Mass if we can, because you children remind us adults of what the Lord Jesus said: 'Unless you become like a little child, you cannot enter the kingdom of heaven.' So just by being children you remind us what we must be like to become like the saints and angels.

"Therefore, since you represent the heavenly host of saints and angels, I want you to behave as such. Of course, I know that you are not yet saints, and I know you are not angels. You fight with your brothers and sisters. Some of you are bullies and others are cowards. You lie and cheat and have bad thoughts. You disobey your parents and are selfish and unkind. Nevertheless, you have a role to play in the Divine Liturgy, because despite all that, you are called to reflect something greater. You are called from what you are not to become all that you shall be; and if you are struck with a sense of awe at what I am expecting of you, think how *I* feel, for I am a sinner just like you are, and I am called to represent Christ Himself to the people.

"Since all of this is true, this is what we are going to do. First of all, when we come into church, we immediately put on albs and cinctures. These are your working clothes. We will serve in the Lord's temple wearing albs and cinctures and be like the boy Samuel who served in the temple of God with simplicity and goodness. When you move in the house of God, do so with simple solemnity. Not po-faced and pious, but also not silly and jokey. Just go about your business — remembering that you are in the house of God, a serious place for a serious business. As you light the candles, set out the books, and prepare for Mass, remember that the people in the pews are watching you. Your reverence and care and love for what you do will be communicated to them and help them to pray.

"Then, before Mass begins, come back to the sacristy with me. There we will put on our surplices, albs, and vestments. Then we will light the candles, charge the thurible, take our places, and wait for the Divine Liturgy to begin.

"When you process into church, remember that you are leading the whole people of God into the presence of God. Our little procession hearkens back to the procession of David and the priests up into the holy city of Zion. The cross will be lifted high, and you will walk with a solemn and stately posture, for you are leading all of us into the presence of the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Know where you are going, and move there with the grace of a child and the dignity of a prince. Where you go, we will follow.

"As you sit in the sanctuary, remember that actions speak louder than words. You may not have many tasks to do, but did you know that they also serve who only stand and wait? Simply by your presence, your reverence, your listening to the Word of God with an attentive ear, you will help to lead the worship and encourage those who see you. When you have a task to do, do it with simplicity and confidence, as befits a servant of the King. Remember: If you are sloppy and casual in your attitude and your posture that will be communicated. It will distract people from Christ toward you, and the Mass is not about you any more than it is about me, the priest.

"Remember that what we do at Mass is the most important thing in your life. Everything else comes after that. Seek first the kingdom of God, and everything else will be added to you. Here at Mass you are seeing that beauty, truth, and love are the three most important treasures on earth, and they are three things you cannot buy. Furthermore, while they are most precious, they are also (from a human point of view) most worthless. What you are doing here when you serve at Mass is not a useful thing. There is no payment. There is no reward — except the reward of knowing that your heart is right with God, and that you have spent an hour on the threshold of heaven.

"And if you have learned how to do that, then throughout your life, whatever else happens, you will be most richly blessed."

#### **PRAYER BEFORE MASS:**

Heavenly Father,

I thank You for allowing me to serve You at this Holy Mass.

Help me to be mindful and attentive of my duties,

Never seeking to draw attention to myself,

And only desiring to bring greater glory to You.

Help me to serve You well,

As if this was my first time,

My last time,

My only time.

#### **ATTENDANCE and PUNCTUALITY:**

- Thank you for volunteering. Your attendance is so important, that you are expected to serve every Mass that you have been scheduled, and to arrive *at least* fifteen minutes before Mass starts.
- The Altar Server Coordinator will provide the server schedule. If you need to be away, please let him know in advance.
- It is your responsibility (or your parents') to arrange for a substitute if you must be absent.
- Server duty ends after finishing the cleanup at the end of Mass.

#### **BEHAVIOR:**

- Do not drink or eat anything (including gum) an hour before Mass. Water and medicines are okay. This is called the "Communion Fast."
- Always be reverent. Remember that you are in a public role serving at the altar of God, and that the church is holy ground. Please do not serve if you have a bad attitude.
- No running, needless talking, gum-chewing, horseplay, etc. Hundreds of eyes are watching you, so people will notice *everything* that you do.
- There is no need to be scared. Honest mistakes are okay, but learn from your mistakes. Always ask if you have any questions.
- Pay attention. Do not daydream or be distracted. Always try to anticipate your next step in the Mass. Watch the priest in case he may need to ask you for something. Always be ready in case he asks you to do something different. This is especially the case for visiting priests.

#### **DRESS:**

- White alb and cincture. (Select the cincture color to match the priest's vestments.)
- Albs should reach the ankles. Shorter than this is unsightly, but longer may cause tripping, so choose carefully. Try to remember your size number for next time.
- Athletic shoes, tennis shoes, sandals, flip-flops, "Crocs," etc. of any kind are <u>never</u> permitted, even during summer. Please wear dark socks and clean dress shoes, preferably black. If needed, bring your dress shoes in a bag and change into them in the sacristy.

#### **POSTURE and MOVEMENT:**

- The four primary postures during Mass are walking, standing, sitting and kneeling.<sup>4</sup> Maintain a straight, formal posture in all of these positions.
- Whenever you cross in front of the tabernacle:
  - *Before* and *after* Mass, genuflect (right knee to the floor) in front of the tabernacle.
  - During the Mass:
    - If you are not carrying something, bow at the waist in front of the tabernacle
    - If you are carrying something, make a head bow in front of the tabernacle.
    - If there is no tabernacle in the sanctuary and you are not carrying anything, bow at the waist to the altar.

Always keep your hands in the "Praying Position" while walking or standing unless you are carrying something. Also keep your hands like this during the "Our Father."

- Hands should be held in the "Praying Position" whenever you are not carrying something. This includes while standing, walking, and even while praying the "Our Father."
- Do not make the Sign of the Cross if you are carrying something.
- When sitting, sit straight up in your seat, keep hands on your knees, and keep both feet flat on the floor (do not cross your legs).
- The Crucifix Server sets the pace during the processions. Walk <u>much</u> slower than normal, at about half normal walking speed.
- Bow your head whenever the three Divine Persons are named together (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated. This includes during the Readings and the Homily.
- Bow your head to the priest when he finishes washing his hands (he will bow back to you).
- Do not leave the sanctuary during the Sign of Peace, and only exchange the Sign of Peace with those next to you.

#### **SET-UP BEFORE EVERY MASS:**

1. In the car on the way to church, begin to think of the importance of your responsibilities.

- 2. Arrive in the sacristy at least 15 minutes before Mass begins and sign in on the altar server board.
- 3. Change into your dress shoes, if necessary.
- 4. Put on your alb and cincture.
- 5. Talk to the other servers and determine whom is going to do what:
  - a. Who will be the Vessels Server?
  - b. Who will be the Crucifix Server? This should normally be the tallest server.
  - c. Who will be the Book Server?
- 6. Light the six altar candles. (Be cautious with fire! Ask the priest or a sacristan to help you if needed.)
- 7. Light the ambo candles if there are any.
- 8. Five minutes before Mass begins put the gifts (the bread and wine) on the gift table by the double doors near the back of the church. (The sacristans may have already done this.)

#### **CLEAN-UP AFTER MASS:**

- <u>NEVER</u> pour any crumbs from the ciboria or Precious Blood from the chalices down the sink drain. They are Jesus Christ. Ask the priest to consume any crumbs or Precious Blood immediately.
- Extinguish all candles using the candle snuffer or blow <u>very</u> gently. If you blow hard you will blow wax onto the altar cloths, the drip trays, or the floor.
- Place your alb and cincture neatly on their hanger. Try not to let them touch the floor (this is not only to keep them clean, but also because they have been blessed.)







